Grateful Neighborhood Residents Say SVDP Food Pantry Is A Blessing

Frank (above) was quietly thankful as he left the St. Vincent de Paul Food Pantry one recent morning after choosing free groceries.

Hesitant at first to speak with staff, he later explained what a difference the food would make for his family: Having raised his own kids alone, he is now supporting grandchildren, Frank said. In addition, he is letting several homeless family members with toddlers stay with him until they can get back on their feet.

His story is similar to ones told by others who stand in line and

fill up the lobby of the pantry at 9am on Tuesday and Thursday.

The free groceries they receive are helping prevent hunger in our community.

Despite limited resources, this pantry is already serving more than five times the number of households Dare to Care Food Bank of Louisville, KY, estimated the facility would serve, when they helped us establish this critical community outreach.

Thanks to all of our supporters, donors and volunteers, we are serving some of the poorest

households in metro Louisville.

Additional thanks to everyone who participated in Walmart's "Fight Hunger Spark Change" online campaign last month. St. Vincent de Paul earned \$5,000 by helping cast enough votes to land Dare to Care's Food Pantry in the Top 50 food-bank vote-getters nationwide!

OUR MISSION STATEMENT

St. Vincent de Paul is a nonprofit charity dedicated to serving the poor and providing others with the opportunity to serve. St. Vincent de Paul serves people in need, including those who are homeless, living in poverty or who suffer from addiction and mental illness, as well as people who are in crisis or facing unexpected hardship.

Through a continuum of care that includes food, shelter, affordable housing, counseling and emergency financial assistance with rent and utility bills, St. Vincent de Paul assists people, regardless of their background or faith, with the goal of helping each person achieve self-sufficiency.

SVDP Case Managers Learn Best Practices at Inner-City Los Angeles Youth Center

Prior to the opening of the Family Success Center on September 29, three St. Vincent de Paul employees spent two days in Los Angeles shadowing the Bresee Foundation, which provides comprehensive after-school programs and family services to young people.

The Bresee Foundation was established in 1982 to address the social needs of the community. Today, Bresee offers an after-school youth program including homework help, one-on-one tutoring, art, music and dance classes, and a technology lab and multimedia studio.

It also has a pediatric clinic, family supportive services and case management, and a gang prevention program.

Bresee has awarded more than 100 students nearly \$500,000 in college scholarships and provided career-readiness and employment to more than 500 youth.

Kendra Oatis, program manager of children and families programs at St. Vincent de Paul, served as an intern at Bresee in 2008 during her senior year of college. This relationship led to the opportunity to spend time observing an established after-school program.

Along with Oatis, Julio Anthony, SVDP's case manager for children and families, and Beth White, SVDP's assistant director of programs, were able to see the Bresee Youth Center in action, as well as spend time talking about successes and failures with several members of the Bresee staff. The group split up to observe different grade levels during homework help

and were also able to participate in several workshops, such as golf, dance, and art.

In meetings with many of Bresee's staff members, including director of programs Daniel McWhirter, the group learned about the operations, planning, and assessment of a successful after-school program.

In discussions with Dunia Perich, director of family services, they were able to gain insight about serving both student and family, including various assessments and service plan templates.

Bresee also provided opportunities for the group to talk with Blanca Orellana, director of middle school programs, to learn more about running a homework center and coordinating tutoring services.

In addition to program operation, the group met with Leigh Ann Greenfield, volunteer coordinator,

to discuss recruitment of volunteers and how to create a specific volunteer experience that uses the skills of volunteers to meet the needs of the organization.

The two days the group spent at the Bresee Foundation provided them with fresh ideas and knowledge to begin implementing the after-school program in the Family Success Center. Twenty-six students are currently registered, but the number is expected to increase.

The trip to Los Angeles to shadow the Bresee Foundation and continued communication with its staff have proven very beneficial to the implementation of SVDP's program.
