FSC Report Card

This academic year, the Family Success Center is serving 41 children in an after-school setting. Of that number,

- 11 children have an IEP with JCPS (Individualized Educational Program),
- 15 children with learning differences,
- 10 children with ADHD,
- 7 with a documented learning disability,
- 4 children with behavioral disorders.

All children in the program have experienced homelessness.

In the five years since opening, the Family Success Center has been host to dental care clinics, a wrestling team, cooking classes, STEAM summer camps, hours of tutoring, and numerous other of programs and services. With a goal of providing educational and social development opportunities for at-risk children who have experienced extreme poverty and homelessness, the FSC has accomplished this and more.

Consider this success story, as told by a parent whose son attends the after-school program at the Family Success Center.

"Riley started at the SVDP Family Success Center after being with another after-school program for several months and struggling to get his homework done correctly and on time. As a working mother, I would get off at 5:30 and race to get him by 6:00 across town. No one was helping with his homework, so it was either not done or not done correctly. We would then get home, get dinner started, try to do homework, get baths and get in bed by 9:00. Honestly, I was exhausted. He was falling behind on his sight words and he really needed someone with more time to help him with his homework. He needed more individual attention."

"After many a late night homework sessions that usually ended in tears (either his or mine) a neighbor suggested St. Vincent de Paul. It was just around the corner and they were open until 7, so no more speeding to pick him up! The icing on the cake was the professional staff who worked with the kids. I very quickly saw a change in him when I picked him up from this program. His tutor showed him the kindness and attention he needed and with our last report card he received the highest marks in sight words which he had been struggling with all year! His teacher has mentioned dyslexia earlier in the year. He needed that extra time and attention. As a mother, I knew he was capable!

"Had it not been for the blessing of this after-school program, I would still be scraping by trying to pay for program that was little more than a day care when my son needed real help with his education. I cannot thank the staff of St. Vincent de Paul enough for the kindness they show me and my child on a daily basis, the opportunities they have provided, and the love and compassion that is evident from every interaction I have had with them."


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Student of the Month

It's open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 to 11 am. Classes covering topics like resume design, privacy and security, and budgeting with spreadsheets may be offered.



On the Ground

The times we live in present all of us with significant challenges, as well as opportunities. St. Vincent de Paul in Louisville has been presented with an abundance of both.

We are challenged—challenged to meet the needs of what seems to be an ever-growing segment of the population that is faced with either homelessness or that is lacking in the essentials of daily life.

And we have opportunities—opportunities to fill the needs of at least some of these individuals and families living without safe, affordable housing.

The opportunity that we are currently embracing has been in the planning for several years. It has taken countless hours of meetings and the collaborative efforts of our staff, board of directors, lawyers, bankers, architects, consultants, community leaders, local and federal government officials, and others in our community.

During the first half of 2009 we will break ground on four new buildings that will provide 54 additional homes on our campus. The designs of these structures are intended to meet the specific needs of several different groups of people within the homeless community. On the corner of Preston and St. Catherine streets will be a new, 24-unit single room occupancy (SRO) structure, very similar to Roberts Hall in serving women with disabilities. Ten efficiency and one-bedroom apartments will be built on St. Catherine Street between St. Jude Women's Recovery Center and the new SRO units.

The remaining two buildings, with 20 two- and three-bedroom apartments, will be constructed on the corner of Kentucky and Jackson streets. The addition of these multiple bedroom apartments will allow us to expand our service to larger families and will result in a significant increase in the number of children residing on our campus.

As always, our goal is to foster ultimate independence for these families and individuals. When combined with our existing shelters, these new residences will enable us to provide the most case-appropriate housing solutions in our ongoing mission to end homelessness.

Additionally, this campus expansion will provide for many new and challenging Volunteer and Support Opportunities.

We will keep you informed as construction progresses and these new homes become reality. Thank you for your continued support.
