# Feeding Those in Need

Angela Leavell will have worked at the Open Hand Kitchen for 12 years this July. She's seen a lot of changes in that time. One of the biggest changes occurred during Covid.

"Much of the staff got Covid, and we had to shut down for 14 days. It was the first time in all the time I've worked here that we had to shut down," Angela remembers.

Currently, the Open Hand Kitchen serves food to a slightly reduced number of people, 7,000 a month. "Some folks haven't come back to the Kitchen yet," Angela explains. "People are more cautious because of Covid."

However, with new protocols in place like masks worn while not eating and togo containers, those who do come here for a meal can be assured that as much as possible is being done to mitigate any chance of contagion.

The Open Hand Kitchen relies on donations of food to operate. "We get a significant amount from Dare to Care, but other donors help us provide a variety of food to our guests," Angela says. "That allows us to have not only nutritious meals, but different foods."

Food donations come from farmers, local grocery stores, and individuals. "Whether it is vegetables, fruit, or meat, we can find a use for it," Angela says.

In addition to food donations, Angela is always grateful for the volunteers who support the Kitchen during lunch and dinner.

"It's nice to see old faces again now that Covid levels are lower, and I am

always thankful for the companies and church groups who take the time to help us," Angela smiles.

The kitchen is open for lunch at noon and for dinner at 5 p.m. The staff can accept food donations anytime between 9:30 a.m. and 5 p.m.

### **Success Story**

John was a client at our men's overnight shelter, Ozanam Inn, who become homeless after the loss of his home due to a fire. John suffered from medical health issues and chronic severe mental illness. He was transferred to the Sanctuary Beds Program after an exacerbation of symptoms stemming from an inability to secure his medications. He had increased anxiety, depression, paranoia, severe nightmares, and a marked increase in blood pressure.

John was referred to the Mental Health/Substance Abuse program (MH/SU) where he was advised to seek a higher level of care via Our Lady of Peace out-patient treatment followed by one-on-one therapy from MH/SU staff and medications management from an advanced practice registered Psych Nurse at Phoenix Health Care. Through hard work and use of resources via Ozanam Inn Shelter, MH/SU staff, and our partner agencies, John was able to secure housing and was successfully discharged on April 29, 2022.

While help with financial assistance is the primary focus, the Vincentians at this parish like to give back by completing projects for those in need. Bob describes the physical work as "good for the soul."


"There's something satisfying about going to a person's home and doing physical work and seeing the results when you're done," Bob explains.

Bob comes from a family of Vincentians. His wife joined the organization and he followed along, but his father had been a Vincentian as well. "Almost any Vincentian I know has relatives who are Vincentians, too," he relates. "It's kind of a tradition."

The most important thing Bob feels he gets out of working with the Vincentians is spiritual growth. "There's something about good works that feeds the soul and brings you so much gratitude for the life you have and the opportunities you have to give," he shares. "It brings me closer to God."
