Coming Home: Veterans Find Hope at SVDP

St. Vincent de Paul Louisville works in conjunction with the Veterans Administration office to serve homeless veterans. The program provides a room and bed at our men's emergency shelter, Ozanam Inn, and houses 20 veterans at any given moment. Veterans stay on campus and work with a case manager to get all the benefits available to them through the VA. The veterans have access to mental health and substance use treatment on campus, and they work to become self-reliant. The ultimate goal of the program is to help veterans get off the street and into homes of their own. Our case managers, counselors, and benefits navigators work tirelessly to help these veterans find homes.

Shana Burnley is the case manager for our Veterans Program.* She works with the men from referral to home. This relationship can last for a few months or a year, depending on the needs of each man. She takes them through the bureaucracy that can be difficult for the veterans to manage. She is a sounding board to their fears and frustrations, and she brings the veterans hope of a better future. "These veterans need empathy and compassion," Shana explains. "Sometimes all they need is to know they've been heard."

When asked why she feels such empathy toward the veterans, Shana explains that she has many veterans in her life. "Both my dad and my husband are vets," she smiles. "Our veterans know that I get it."

Shana says that each veteran is special, with his own needs and goals. "I have one gentleman who came into the program and within a few weeks, he was ready to start looking for a home," she says. "I've had others who have been here a year. Everyone is in their own place on the path to self-sufficiency."

When asked about a proud moment for her, Shana tells us about "Nate." Nate came to St. Vincent de Paul Louisville at a low point in his life. Homelessness and poverty had left him feeling hopeless. "I think he was close to giving up," Shana remembers. "But we started talking and started taking steps to get Nate the benefits he needs, and I saw him open up. I saw the hope in his eyes."

Nate now has a job, and he is working with Shana to find a home of his own. For the first time in a long time, Nate feels like he has a chance. Because of the VA program and our work at St. Vincent de Paul, Nate is on the road home.

Success Story from Ozanam Inn

John was an overnight client at Ozanam Inn who became homeless after the loss of his home from a fire. John, who suffered from medical issues and chronic severe mental illness, was transferred to The Sanctuary Beds Program after an exacerbation of symptoms stemming from an inability to secure his medications. He had increased anxiety, depression, paranoia, severe nightmares and a marked increase in blood pressure. John was referred to the mental health/substance use (MH/SU) program where he was advised to seek a higher level of care via Our Lady of Peace out-patient treatment followed by 1:1 therapy from the MH/SU staff at SVDP and medications management from a Psych Nurse APRN at Phoenix Health Care. John, through hard work and utilization of resources via Ozanam Inn Shelter, the MH/SU staff, and our partner agencies, was able to secure housing and was successfully discharged on April 29, 2022.

St. Vincent de Paul Louisville is grateful to Louisville Metro Government's Office of Resilience and Community Services for providing substantial funding for programs at Ozanam Inn and our domestic violence program. 2022-2023 awarded grants include:

- External Agency Fund (EAF) grant in the amount of \$14,500 for our Transitional Housing/Rapid Rehousing Program for those impacted by domestic violence.
- Homeless Initiative grant in the amount of \$250,000. With this grant, we have been able to open our emergency men's shelter, Ozanam Inn, 24/7.
- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) grant in the amount of \$191,600 for our men's emergency shelter, Ozanam Inn, which allowed us, in conjunction with the Homeless Initiative grant, to open Ozanam Inn 24/7 and increase the number of support staff who can provide services to those in need at the shelter.

Les describes the work of the conference as a balancing act between being a good steward of the resources the conference receives and be compassionate to those in need. "We need to give those in need a hand up rather than a handout," he shares. "We want those who can to play an active role in the help that is given to them."

When asked about the success of the conference, Les points to an extremely supportive pastor. "We are very grateful to Father Harris, who came to the parish interested in knowing what the church could do to support the Vincentians," explains Les.

Whether you have a few hours every week or can only attend a home visit once or twice a year, Les explains that there's a place for you with the Vincentians. "If you have a lot of time to dedicate or only a little time available, the Vincentians can use your help," he says.
